Connecticut Political Debates 2022

Connecticut Public, in partnership with the League of Women Voters of Connecticut, presents a series of eight weekly political debates between the key candidates in advance of the midterm November 2022 elections, including debates for the statewide offices of Governor and Secretary of the State, as well as U.S. Senate and Connecticut's five U.S. Congressional districts.

This toolkit provides all you need to to host a **Debate Watch Party**. A Debate Watch Party provides a forum for you, your family, friends and community members to watch the Debates live and hear directly from candidates, broaden your understanding of the issues and how they impact your community, and, engage in productive conversation with others.

To Begin: choose the Debate or Debates you would like to watch for a Debate Watch Party. For instance, you may want to watch the candidates in your district debate, as well as the Governor's debate, and host two debate parties.

All debates will be live, every Thursday at 8 p.m. beginning September 15 through October 27, and Tuesday October 25 on the following platforms::

Prior to the Debate:

- · Choose the location of your Debate Watch Party
- · Choose your host/discussion moderator
- · Select date or dates
- Select time and platform (TV, radio, or streaming on website or social)
- · Invite your guests one month prior (See sample invitation at the end of the toolkit)
- Let Connecticut Public know when and where your debate party will be held. Simply click "Submit An Event" button on our Event calendar and your event will be added to our website. The first 25 that list their watch party on the Connecticut Public event page will receive a swag bag!
- · Confirm guests with a reminder email
- · Send link to candidate profiles
- · Coordinate technical needs for streaming or broadcast
- Plan refreshments and beverages

Host/Moderator Duties During the Debate Watch Party



- Welcome guests
- Provide overview As we watch the debate we encourage everyone to listen
 actively as we check off the topics on the bingo cards that we hear the candidates
 mention, along with the initials of the candidate that mentions the topic.
 Following the debate we will discuss the questions and the candidates' answers.
- Distribute BINGO Topic cards
 Check off each word or topic as the candidate mentions it. Use our
 Debate Watch Policy Bingo Card or create your own with topics important to your audience (See Printable Bingo cards at the end of the toolkit)
- Distribute Questions for discussion (OR ASK AT END OF DEBATE)
 Make it a safe space. These issues are important and impact people's lives and people often have strong opinions. Make sure people are respectful of each other and that everyone gets a chance to talk.
- What did you like about what the candidates said? Why?
- What did you not like? Why?
- Was anything that the candidates said surprising to you?
- · Did the candidates not talk about something that matters to you?
- · What are the issues that are most important to you?
- · What issues were not discussed?
- · Invite guests to Post on Social Media #VoteCT
- Register people to vote.
